# Irruption Year! By: Sue Tinkle

Have you seen any unusual birds lately? This winter will be a very good one here for purple finches, pine siskins, crossbills, pine and evening grosbeaks, and redpolls, along with red breasted nuthatches. Redpolls have already been seen in the Champaign area along with white winged crossbills. One lucky birder in St. Joseph had a flock of evening grosbeaks!

According to ornithologist Steve Bailey, this year has been the biggest irruption year ever of pine siskins for the entire United States! Pine siskins have been reported everywhere it seems; we ourselves have seen flocks of upwards to 80 -90 in our backyard. Last year we did not have a single one. Often a "masting" year is followed by a poor seed production year. Masting occurs when a single species produces a very large number of seeds across thousands of miles of forest in the same year. When the conifers in boreal forests of Canada and Northern U.S. experience this phenomenon, birds breed earlier, have more offspring, and a population boom occurs. This is problematic when a lean year occurs the following year. A masting year is typically followed by a low production year, creating a migration in order to find a new food source. This feast or famine creates irregular winter migrations, i.e. irruptions.

The bottom line is that irruptions are triggered by food shortages, such as failure of the coniferous cone crops over a large geographical area. The reasons for all of this stated above is more complex than what I can explain here. With climate change, moisture conditions, global warming, carbon dioxide emissions, etc., affecting why food supplies are fluctuating so erratically compared to normal cycles of the past like every other year for some conifers.

Just a note about one of the birds you might see at your feeders this winter: the purple finch. This is

a species which has been misidentified a lot and has created confusion among many backyard bird feeder enthusiasts. The house finches we see at our feeders all year round can exhibit a lot of variation in their color and patterns, but one thing never changes. They are all very streaky. Some males are more orangey than others. Some even have similar color to a purple finch but purple finches are not here in the summer. Some years they are not here at all as they live far north into Canada. The first time I saw a female purple finch on my feeder many years ago I thought I had a small rose breasted grosbeak. The head stripe is really a helpful identification tool. If you have to study a male to see if it is a house finch or a purple, it is probably not a purple. Look at a good bird book and learn the difference, as you very well might be lucky this winter to see a purple finch!

#### Birds of a Feather Exhibit

We are pleased to announce that the Danville Art League has chosen birds as the main theme for the winter exhibit at their Braughamin Gallery located at 320 N Franklin Street in Danville. Carol Garver; teacher, artist, and board member, will be announcing this to the public soon, but she wanted to be sure that Middlefork Audubon members were made aware in advance and encouraged to participate in this opportunity to show their work

Anyone can have their original artwork displayed there as long as certain criteria are met. Pieces should be framed and ready to hang with a wire (not a saw tooth hanger). There must be a bird, feathers, or bird theme within the artwork itself. This exhibit is open to 2D and 3D, meaning paintings of any medium, photographs, sculptures, ceramics, carvings, etc. There are display cases and large open tables for artwork not conducive to hanging, such as small paintings on an easel, or 3D pieces.

This is not a contest and there is no entry fee required. It is instead a celebration of our avian friends and the joy they bring into our world. Open house and length of show will be determined by COVID-19 cases in Vermilion County.

The art league is asking that you drop off your art work on Saturday, January 16 between the hours of 10:00 AM and 1:00 PM. If you have a conflict with this time frame and wish to exhibit an original work, please call Sue Tinkle at 217 427-6109 to make other arrangements.

#### **Christmas Bird Count**

#### 2020 Bluebird Monitoring Season Results

Middlefork Audubon is always pleased to be able to brag a bit about the ongoing nest box monitoring program we oversee in Vermilion County. This project is possible thanks to so many volunteers who weekly check boxes throughout the nesting season at their home, at the Vermilion County Conservation District parks, public golf courses, and farms all around the county. A BIG thank you to all the 2020 volunteers who continued to monitor nest boxes throughout Vermilion County during the global pandemic and, conversely, we greatly respect those who were not comfortable traveling to their trail this year. Hopefully we can all be safely back in the field again next season!

Either way, our feathered friends resumed nesting last spring and fledged young through it all. For the 2020 nest box monitoring season, 233 next boxes fledged 438 Eastern Bluebirds. All native bird species are allowed to remain in a nest box to be tallied along with the Eastern Bluebirds. Following are totals for all fledged species from the Vermilion County project.

A special note: In addition to counting bluebirds, one couple in Potomac monitors 48 gourds at their home where 129 Purple Martins fledged!
